After the hibernation of Winter, it's been great to enjoy the freedom to roam around the Hut in the lighter and warmer evenings.



Fund Raising Update

Hello to all parents, beavers, cubs and scouts from *your* fund raising committee. We are a ramshackle and inexperienced (in fund raising terms!) group of parents who happened to be at the AGM when Leander's financial position was explained, and who have agreed to try to help.

In essence it is currently costing £2000 each year more to run the troupe than is received from all sources. In addition, equipment including some boats will soon require replacement, and we could do with purchasing other equipment, especially for the younger members' activities.

It was agreed that we need to raise the profile of fund raising and to plan a programme of activities. I hope that you will recognise that it is *everyone's business* to help get the finances on to an even keel. If we don't, then the opportunities which a lot of people work very hard to provide and which our children get so much from will be jeopardised.

Our committee has thought through a range of options, has agreed the following to give us a manageable initial focus, and is prepared to lead the work. However it won't happen unless we receive *active support*, especially from parents. There are currently 60 families with beavers, cubs or scouts in the Group. I hope that all will be prepared to become involved in some way or other over the coming months. These are our immediate plans, with an indication of who will be leading the work:

Coxwain's Corner

For this edition, lots of news about activities and the scouts who have taken part in them. Troop nights have been very well attended, with well over 25 scouts at each meeting and every available boat we have in use.

Many thanks to Chris Hampton and John Bridger, our canoeing instructors, who have regularly taken out a group of boys and girls who are now progressing through their BCU qualifications. All those who have joined the troop recently have been kayaking, it is very rewarding to see how confident they look on the water.

Our first event after Easter was the District six a side football competition, once again organised by Karen and held at Kingsmeadow. The juniors played valiantly but were up against some very good teams, with 7th Malden juniors eventually taking the trophy. The seniors however played brilliantly and retained the trophy they won last year.

We have just been notified that Leander Senior and Junior teams have been selected for the Royal Naval Recognised Units Soccer Sixes Tournament at HMS Excellent, Portsmouth, in late September. This is a very prestigious event (we made the senior semi final last year), which is now heavily over-subscribed, so we are lucky to have a place.

In June, Kingston Rotary Club organised a Dragon Boat Racing event, based at Canbury Gardens, for which a joint team from Leander and Surbiton Sealions had been entered. This turned out to be a really good day, with some very close and exciting races. We had a crew of 16 paddlers, 9 scouts and 7 adults and we were very pleased that out of 24 teams we put up the 4th fastest time. All the other teams had adult crews, so we did extremely well. The event was very well organised, with each race of 3 boats timed over a 400 metre course – in our best race of the day, there was only 6 tenths of a second difference between the 3 boats! Next year we will be practising in good time – we can do better! The National Scout Regatta, held jointly with the Sea Rangers in July, was a great success, with good weather and exciting racing. The only unfortunate point was that all our Senior entrants were suddenly spirited away to complete their Duke of Edingburgh bronze award, which had been postponed from earlier in the year because of foot and mouth. All the scouts gave of their best and did very well up against some really good teams. Well done Nick, Zoe, Chris, Callum, Tom. Mattie, Robbie, Miles, John, Alex, Danica, Ella, Jack, Will and Nathan.

The Ventures swept the board, winning single dinghy, sculling over the stern and the gig race, gaining them the Venture Trophy. This last race, against our old rivals Warspite, who are very accomplished, was fantastic. I was on the course in a safety boat to enable Mike Freeman to take some photographs and from our parallel viewpoint, the boats were neck and neck all the way. The sound from the river bank with every Leander supporter in full voice, was incredible. Congratulations to Matt Freeman, Michael King, Jonathan Burr and Danny Wileman, and of course, Nathan McGuiness, who coxed the boat to victory.

We finished off the term, on a rather wet and dismal night, with a barbecue, but, in the true spirit of Leander, every one went out in the boats and got thoroughly drenched.

We will be leaving for Summer Camp, at Tolmers Scout Camp and Activity site on the 28th July. The numbers have grown dramatically, with 16 scouts going, to experience a week jam-packed with activities.

Now a note of thanks to those who normally don't get a mention. To all the members of the Leander Executive Committee, who spend many hours supporting the activities of the Group and the unique Headquarters we use. To Mike Freeman for organising HQ lettings, the cleaning rotas and mowing the lawn. To the new Fund Raising Committee, who have seized the initiative and have all sorts of exciting ideas to implement.

A special thanks to two people who look after vital functions. To Nigel Duffin, the Group Chairman, who spends many hours dealing with the waiting list and enquiring parents and ensuring that boys and girls move from section to section at the right time. To Skipper, Keith Maund, whose drive and unique ability to help keep Leander funded and in the eye of the public, is now legendary.

Finally, my thanks to Karen Loizu, who as assistant Leader of the Troop has done a fantastic job; with 33 Scouts on the books it takes an enormous amount of time to organise events, instruct and help run the troop. Between us we can be justifiably proud of having a very active and very enthusiastic section, in which every scout has the opportunity to learn and practise seamanship, gain awards and qualifications and to take part in a wide range of scouting activities.
