The evening camp fire was soon throwing some warmth out into the cool evening as everyone gathered to enjoy some good old campfire songs, ably led by Karen and the sketches prepared by each team. A 30 mile Trip upriver in 1938

Paul Clements, of the Leander Guild, tells in the Newsletter of recently finding a small black notebook, which was the log of a boat journey made in 1938 for his First Class badge.

06:00pm. Left home, stowed gear in boat and cast off at 06:15pm. Called in at HQ to say 'Howdo' and finally got away by 06:25pm.

07:20pm. Molesey Lock. A very uneventful row enlivened by a fisherman who lost his float and river steamers kicking up an unholy wash.

08:20pm. Reached Sunbury Lock. Even more uneventful!

09:15pm. Arrived at Brownacres, Walton-on-Thames (a sports club with some link with Leander who were allowed to camp there). Pitched tent etc. before dark.

10:00pm. Supper – sausages, bread, butter, jam, biscuits and tea – what a feast. Another camp nearby had a large dog which was very fond of sausages. 06:15am. Woke up by sounds of scuffling and smacking of lips. It was the dog again but I saved the sausages!

07:45am. Got up and had a swim and also washed in the process.

10:00am. Packed up camp and set off again upstream.

01:30pm Arrived at Chertsey Lock in a shower of rain. (Here lived some distant relatives with a wild garden by the weir stream where I could camp)

02:30pm. Pitched tent etc. and went for a walk. Met a tame crow which liked to sit on my shoulder and peck my ear while I fed it on ants. After tea I took the owner and family up to Halsham and back in their punt. After supper a water rat ran by about 12 inches from my foot and jumped into the water, closely followed by another one.

10:15pm. Turned in. A lot of noise from the weir.

08:00am. Got up and washed in the river but did not swim owing to the very strong weir stream.

11:45am. Finished packing up, thanked the owner and set off down stream .

01:15pm. Shepperton Lock. Got talking to the crew of a tug towing a barge, with the resulting offer of a tow to Kingston. As I had rowed the required distance I accepted. Unfortunately the tug was going too fast for comfort and my watch was jerked under the floorboards so I did not know the time. At Sunbury Lock I gave the bargee a sausage by way of payment! The tug dropped me off at Kingston Bridge so I had to row the rest of the way home, where I arrived at 03:15pm after about 30 miles.

Boat – my 9ft. dinghy. A bit small for me and all the gear. Hardly leaked at all. (It originally cost £3 which I borrowed from my father. Over a few years I repaid 30 shillings and he then cancelled the debt, so I sold it for £10).

Latrines – Outside lavatories at both sites.

Cooking – No fires allowed so used a small petrol primus, used two pennyworth of fuel.

Conclusions – It was a pleasant trip which I remember well although it was 65 years ago.

Explorers, Leaders and Subs at the AGM

This brief report of the Leander AGM on 16th May was written by Dick Garnish, Group Secretary, for the Guild Newsletter.

The AGM for the year ending 5th April 2002 was dominated by three main topics, which are likely to be of concern to the Group for some months to come.

The meeting heard that Scouting in the UK is entering an exciting period with the introduction of a new programme for the Explorer and Network sections. Under this, the responsibility and management of the Explorer section will be with the District even if it has direct links to individual scout groups, in our case, Leander. It was pointed out that, to date, no decisions have been made regarding the working of this management structure. Nevertheless the Group's position on this matter is that the management of its Sea Scout Explorer Section is not something that Leander would wish to relinquish to District control. Leander needs the input and expertise of the older members of the current Scout section (thesoon-to-be Explorer section) during Troop meetings as well as outside activities such as the Great River Race where they can start to take command and put their seamanship skills into practice. Other areas which will require clarification in due course are subscriptions, safety regulations, use of boats and charge certificates.

With the launch of the new Explorer section later this year, it is considered vital that the Group attracts more leaders for this age group and the older Network section. Again on the leader side, the Group is also looking for at least two new leaders for the Beaver Colony as the current leaders will be standing down shortly.

Lastly, the Group's finances have been of some concern to the Executive Committee for a number of months now, with expenditure exceeding income; a position which could become worse as one of the wooden gigs now requires three new planks on each side of the keel. To overcome this, the meeting approved raising subscription levels (the first time for a number of years) for the all sections of the Group. The meeting also approved the introduction of quarterly subscription payments by standing order, a system which, it is hoped, will enable payments to be received on time and without the administrative difficulties which the Group is currently experiencing.
