During the Winter months we always use the entrance from Albany Mews, so those of you who have not been round to the river end of the building may not have seen that the Council have replaced and widened both the landing stages. This should make launching much easier and the added width will improve both access and safety.

The New Year seems to have already been crammed full of land-based activities from night hikes to cooking competitions and, of course, we again took part in the RN swimming gala at Plymouth, all of which is reported in the section news. So now it's time to get our feet wet again and get back to seamanship training in time for the Regatta and of course the RN Inspection in September.

At that same weekend a Scout and Explorer team took part in the Royal Navy Recognised Units Swimming Gala at HMS Raleigh, Plymouth, a very busy weekend and great experience staying on a naval base.

The District Night Hike traversed the difficult territory around Holmbury St Mary and Holmbury Hill, quite a challenge for young teams. Although getting rather lost they all enjoyed themselves and stayed the night at Leander HQ.

The County Night Exercise followed just a week ago. After some serious navigational instruction, we decided that the teams would benefit from a leader going out with them, i.e. noncompetitive, to ensure that map and compass technique was being applied properly. With 45 teams taking part, if they had been in competition they would have finished in the first 10 teams.

Rock for the Scouts' Tsunami Appeal

On Saturday, 12 March the Cub Leaders held an evening of musical entertainment in aid of the Scout Association Tsunami Appeal and raised over \pounds 380.

The Scout Association has set up this appeal as a way of making a direct contribution to those in the Asia Pacific Region in this time of great need. It's about Scouts helping Scouts. The money from the appeal will go directly to fund regeneration work in the affected regions. It will be used to re-start and re-equip Scout Groups, and to support Scout projects to help rebuild communities. Some of the funds raised may be for emergencies, but most will be for longer-term recovery and development projects.

It is part of a global Scout effort. The Association in the UK is working closely with the Asia-Pacific Regional Office, which has encouraged each national Scout organisation to open routes for the appeal.

The evening featured three bands all with Leander connections, either past or present. The Fallacy, with Ed Barnard on bass, were the first to kick off with lively funky, punk rock. They were followed by Pretty Polly an indie rock band, with Tom Richards on keyboard. Finally, the Canburys, a country Irish folk band, with Patrick Geraghty on fiddle and Simon Richards on guitar, ended the evening on a quieter note.

All in all it was a successful evening, though we could have done with a bit more adult support from parents. Our thanks go to everyone who helped, the bands who made the whole thing possible and, of course, all who bought tickets.
